Stories from our members:

My first Thanksgiving in Tromsø.

I went to Tromsø in 1969 on an exchange program and was living with a family there while attending the lærer skole (teachers training school). The family was very nice; they all spoke English well but spoke only Norwegian with me so I could learn the language. I fended for myself for meals during the week, but on Sundays joined the family for dinner. Towards the late fall I became sick and was bedridden for several days. When I felt well enough to eat, the mother brought me some of their dinner to my room in bed. It just happened to be Thanksgiving Thursday (a holiday not observed in Norway) and the dinner was blood pudding! I had never even heard of it before! No, I could not stomach it, and told my host that I wasn't ready to eat yet! Later, I actually acquired a bit of a taste for it, but it was never a favorite. But I never forget that Thanksgiving. And hence the Recipe of the Month this month!

A Later Thanksgiving in Tromsø.

I returned to Tromsø in 1978 (after working two years in Bergen and attaining a Master's degree in fisheries at the University of Washington in Seattle). In Tromsø I worked at the Biological Station in Oceanography and lived in an apartment with two other people also working at the same place, one American and one Norwegian. As Thanksgiving approached, we decided to have a dinner party for many of our friends. And since Thanksgiving was approaching, we had to have a turkey. But, alas, there was no turkey to be found in Tromsø; most stores weren't even sure what that was. But hey, there were turkeys in Bergen, only 1,129 miles south! We had friends at the Bergen Biological Station who were willing to secure us a turkey and put it on a plane north. In those days, one loaded one's own luggage onto the carts and then went through the gates showing tickets to board. So, the turkey went on the cart and arrived in Tromsø, with us at the gate ready to claim it! Flying free! The menu was Turkey, Reindeer, and Cod plus all the trimmings. It was a great success, but when I wrote my family about it, they were very distressed that I had Rudolf for Thanksgiving.

Recipe of the Month - Blood Pudding

Do go to the site above for stories about blood pudding from Norway. The blood would come from animals on the farm, sheep, goats, pig. In these times, city folk can buy blood at the supermarket.

Ingredients

1 litre blood
125 g / 4,4 oz stale bread (or oats)
150 g / 5,3 oz melted butter (or cubed suet)
300 ml water
200 g / 7 oz Lyle's Golden Syrup
½ tsp salt
½ tsp cloves
¾ tsp pepper
1 tsp allspice
75 g / 3 oz wholewheat flour about 150 g / 6 oz flour raisins (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Run the blood through a strainer to remove lumps. Just to be on the safe side.
- 2. Crumble the bread with your hands.
- 3. Melt the butter and mix it with the blood, water, syrup, spices, flour and breadcrumbs. Add as much raisins as you like. Leave to rest overnight.
- 4. The next day, put the oven on 200C/390F. Line a small baking tray or two loaf tins with parchment paper. Cover with tin foil and bake in a bain-marie (water bath) for about 1.5 hour.

Thanksgiving traditions in Norway

Thanksgiving, originally the day of giving thanks for the harvest, is celebrated in various ways on differing days round the world, reflecting the diversity of cultural and religious tradition. In the U.S. and Canada, the history of Thanksgiving can be traced back to the Reformation. As in many other countries, it also hallmarks the harvest.

The celebration of Thanksgiving in Norway differs. In name, it's nearly the same: *Høsttakkefest* translates directly to "Harvest Thanksgiving Feast." But its roots are older and reflect both religious and secular tradition. The religious roots of Høsttakkefest predate the adoption of Christianity in Norway. In the ancient city of Chonae, on September 29, 380 AD, according to the western liturgical calendar, a church was consecrated to the Archangel Michael. With time, that date was celebrated in the Catholic Church as Michaelmas,

spelled Mikkelsmess in the Nordic countries. In medieval Europe, it became associated with the harvest at the end of the farming year. So, in Norway, the annual Høsttakkefest was held along with Mikkelsmess or on a Sunday before or after it. In 1770, Mikkelsmess was abolished as a public church holiday in Denmark and Norway. In 1918 Mikkelsmess was reinstated in the Norwegian liturgical calendar, and from 1999 on, its celebration is optional in the Church of Norway. Today Norwegian calendars annotate September 29 as Mikkelsmess. The secular roots of Høsttakkefest are agrarian and tied to the practice of transhumance, the seasonal movement of people with their livestock between lower valleys in winter and higher pastures in summer. In rural Norway, Høsttakkefest originally was called *Buferdsdagen*, also spelled *Bufardag*, traditionally the autumn day on which a farm's livestock and its tenders moved from a higher summer farm, called a seter, to the main farm in the valley below. Transhumance was not much practiced in English-speaking countries, so Buferdsdagen is one of the few words in Norwegian that has no equivalent in English. The date of Høsttakkefest is not set for the country, so the dates of its celebration vary from early September to late October and occasionally early November. In 2015, the most lavish celebration of Høsttakkefest was held on Tuesday, September 8, in the National Cathedral in Trondheim. In addition to the church service, it included performances by a band for disabled persons, two choirs, dancers from the Trondheim Cathedral School, and a juggler.
